Indianapolis' proud heritage will be evident as you become familiar with our best known landmarks – Monument Circle, the State Capitol, the Scottish Rite Cathedral, the Children's Museum, Indiana Repertory Theatre, and Lockerbie Square (home of Raggedy Ann and Andy and Little Orphan Annie). Our downtown renovation has restored landmarks such as the country's first Union Station and the Soldiers and Sailors Monument commemorating the valor of those who served in the Civil War. New facilities in downtown are the Conseco Fieldhouse and the Indiana State Museum.

On the Circle, you will see the first of the city's grand "movie palaces," the Hilbert Circle Theatre, built in 1916 and now the home of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra. Christ Church Cathedral is the oldest building on the Circle. Learn the significance of the "Little Church on the Circle" and marvel at the stained-glass windows in the style of Louis Comfort Tiffany.

No trip to Indianapolis would be complete without a visit to where our most noted sporting venue, the **Indianapolis Motor Speedway**, where the world-famous Indianapolis 500 takes place. You will have the opportunity to visit the museum and an opportunity to take a lap around the track (at a much slower pace!).

Lunch will be on your own at Shapiro's Delicatessen – an Indianapolis institution! "Cook good, serve generous, price modestly, and people will come." These words to live and nosh by have been the guiding philosophy of Shapiro's Delicatessen and Cafeteria since 1905. More than 2,000 customers drop in each day for breakfast, lunch, and dinner at its two locations. It is far and away Indiana's, and many would argue the Midwest's, prime forum for corned beef and pastrami piled high on rye or egg bun and for matzo ball and

chicken noodle soups, and for such comfort foods as Swiss steak, baked chicken, meat loaf, macaroni and cheese, and unconscionably high-rise pies, cakes, and pastries. And it is perhaps the last Hoosier haven for smoked pickled tongue.

Step into the past, as we tour the homes of two of Indianapolis' finest historical mansions: the home of President Benjamin Harrison and the James Whitcomb Riley Home. Built in 1875, President Benjamin Harrison's home is a masterpiece of Italianate architecture. Sixteen rooms have been restored and are resplendent with many of the original furnishings and keepsakes. The former third floor ballroom serves as a museum in which many artifacts of the Harrisons' professional and personal lives are exhibited.

Authorities describe the Lockerbie Street Home of James Whitcomb Riley (also a registered National Historic Landmark) as one of the finest Victorian preservations in the United States. This home of the creator of Little Orphan Annie reflects a genteel life revolving around good food, good company and good books.

Your tour will take you by the mansions of James Allison, Frank Wheeler and Carl Fisher, all co-founders of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

All of these mansions were built between 1909 and 1911. In addition to these homes, your tour will include drive-by views of other significant homes, such as Booth Tarkington's residence (built in 1911), the Kemper House (known as the wedding cake house) built in 1873, the Propylaeum and Carriage House, built in 1890, and the Meredith Nicholson home, known as the "House of a Thousand Candles."
