Thursday, October 18, 2007: Baltimore—City of Champions! 10:00 am–2:00 pm

Baltimore's sports heritage is long and illustrious. Babe Ruth, Pam Shriver, and even Seabiscuit all have important ties to our city. **Oriole Park At Camden Yards** – You'll enjoy a behind the scenes look at one of baseball's most famous parks. You'll learn about the history of baseball in Baltimore and see where some of the game's more recent sluggers have hit homeruns out onto Eutaw St. **Sports Legends at Camden Yards** – This brand new world-class museum houses countless pieces of Baltimore sports history. From an Orioles World Series trophy to Johnny Unitas's First Communion Certificate, it's all at Sports Legends. **Babe Ruth Birthplace and Museum** – This row house was actually the home of the Babe's grandparents. A campaign in the 1960s saved the building from demolition and it now houses the Babe Ruth museum, featuring the room in which he was born restored just as it was on February 6, 1895 (Ruth's birthday). **City Tour** – You'll also be treated to a city tour narrated by a knowledgeable local guide. Learn about the history of Baltimore and how it relates to our sports legacy!

Thursday October 18, 2007: Annapolis 9:00 am–3:00 pm

This tour highlights many of Annapolis's best known landmarks, monuments, and sights. **Annapolis, the capital city of Maryland** is nestled on the rivers and creeks leading to the Chesapeake Bay. The capital of Maryland was moved here from St. Mary's City in 1695. It is the oldest incorporated city in the state. **Maryland State House** is the oldest state capitol building in the nation in continuous use. It was here that George Washington resigned his commission as Commander-in Chief of the Continental Armies to become the President of the United States. The Treaty of Paris was signed here in 1783, officially ending the American Revolution. **St. John's College** is the alma mater of Francis Scott Key. **U.S. Naval Academy**: The academy, established in 1845, covers more than 300 acres on the south side of the Severn River. **Bancroft Hall**, the world's largest student dormitory, has a model Midshipmen's room. At the **Academy Chapel** you will visit the crypt beneath with the bronze and marble sarcophagus of John Paul Jones, naval hero of the American Revolution. After your tour, walk to the bustling **Harbor** to browse antique shops, boutiques and art galleries. Lunch is on your own. *Note: photo ID needed to enter State House and Naval Academy.*

Thursday, October 18, 2007: Washington D.C. 9:00 am–4:00 pm

This tour highlights many of Washington D.C.'s best known landmarks, monuments, and sights.

First you'll meet your guide and depart the busy port city of Baltimore for a leisurely ride to **Washington D.C.**

Upon arriving in Washington, your knowledgeable guide will begin pointing out and explaining the history of some important landmarks in our nation's capital, including the **Supreme Court**, the **Capitol Building**, the **Jefferson Memorial**, and the **White House**. You'll stop at the National Mall where your guide will tell you about the many monuments and memorials located there, including the **Washington Monument**, the **World War II Memorial**, the **Vietnam Memorial Wall**, the **Korean War Memorial**, and the **Lincoln Memorial**. You can visit the Smithsonian Institution, also known as "America's Attic." See fascinating exhibits and artifacts at the National Museum of Natural History, the National Museum of American History, and the National Air and Space Museum, among others. This tour allows time for lunch on your own at **Union Station** and further self-guided touring and shopping. Then return to your coach for the trip back to your hotel.
